A Word From the Vicar

Church – What does it really mean? The New Webster's Dictionary defines church as "a building for Christian worship". Anyone who has studied scripture knows there is far more meaning in the word church than just a building.

When I arrived at St. Barnabas' Mission of the Deaf in March 2002 one of the first things I learned was that St. Barnabas wanted to become a church in the diocese. A large packet of printed material was shared with me. The Mission Committee and my predecessor had done a tremendous amount of work related to educating Diocesan Council and the Diocese of Washington on ministry with persons who are deaf. At the time, the information seemed to indicate that by changing the canons and constitution of the diocese we could indeed be called a church and still receive financial assistance from the diocese. But, those changes do not a church make.


St. Paul tells us in I Corinthians 3:16, "Do you not know that you are God's temple and that God's spirit dwells in you?" (NRSV) We, the people, are the church, not the building. When we as Christians meet together we are the church. Without people there would be no church, no worship, no outreach, no learning about God.

Let's look at some other words of St. Paul found in his Epistle to the Romans. In Romans 12:1 he says, "I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship." (NRSV) If you read the entire chapter you will find a very clear explanation and definition of church. It is this definition that we must fulfill before we can hope to be a church. Beginning Sunday, October 5, 2003 I will be teaching an Adult Education class on "What Makes a Church a Church." I hope that every member of St. Barnabas will be present for these very important classes.

May God bless each of us as we grow in the grace of God together. *God's Peace to All, Barbara+*

They listened to an ASL-interpreted introductory tour of the Cathedral and then joined Barbara for lunch. Ed Knight and Rudy Hines also attended the Open House. Rudy explained to Ed the reason for the red doors on some Episcopal churches. Do you know? If the doors are red it means the mortgage is paid off.

Storm Stories from St. Barnabas' members and friends:

Due to Hurricane Isabel, many members of St. Barnabas' lost power for many days and had to throw out food. We are thankful that everyone is safe. Several members replied to the editor's email request for storm stories.

Stephanie and Bram Hightman

were among the lucky ones. Stephanie says, "Just got back from our vacation at the beaches in NJ and Del. Bram and I had enjoyed sightseeing in Rehoboth Beach and Atlantic City for two days. Fortunately we didn't have any problem caused by the hurricane in our condo because it contains a generator that seems preventing power outage. I hope it didn't happen to the others in our congregation."

Tracy Dieter says, "Some of my drive route would be one traffic light working, the next two wouldn't. That was sometimes exciting as we all learned to do four-way stops on six lanes of road."

The storm created a lot of work for our senior Lay Eucharistic Minister **Tom Hattaway**, who works as a horticulturalist for the Federal government.

"In spite of the Federal Government closing and the Metro shutting down, I still reported to work in preparation for the storm with making sand bags and distributing them around the campus of the Smithsonian Institution all day Thursday. At the end of the day, the effect of the storm just arrived as I was driving home on guiet I-95 in heavy rain. I got home safe and watched as Isabel stormed by. We didn't lose any power, not even the cable TV throughout the storm. I went out to check out the storm during lull moments and found three trees downed at neighbors front yards. A trickle of water came out in the storage room though the sump pump kept pumping at full force. The next day all was guiet and I reported to work to clean up the storm mess. A lot of tree branches to clean up plus two trees snapped. Few people were hanging around on the Mall, way less than Friday's usual crowd. **Kary**, my fiancee. got a cabin fever by staying home for two days while I was at work keeping Smithsonian museums safe and clean."
