A Word from the Vicar

Winter is upon us in rare fashion. There is ice on the walk in front of my apartment building (I almost fell yesterday!). Snow is still about four or five inches deep. Brrrr!

But, today the sun was shining which made the cold seem less uncomfortable. Even more than the warmth of the sun was the warmth of Christian love I felt as we gathered for Eucharist this morning and later as we gathered in Hines Hall to share a cup of coffee and some birthday cake to celebrate February birthdays. How blessed we are to have each other!

The Season of Lent is upon us as well. Lent? What does it mean? On Ash Wednesday we will come to church for a traditional service. Ash Wednesday begins the Lenten Season. 
Let us all keep a Holy Lent to prepare for the wonderful celebration our Lord's loving suffering for us and His triumph over sin for us in His resurrection on Easter.

Here Comes the ECD 2004 Convention!

Every once in a while movie stars get "makeovers" - a new hair style, makeup, perhaps a face-lift or a tummy tuck. That's what will be happening with next summer's ECD convention!

We're re-designing the convention, to be held at Bon Secours Spiritual Center in Marriottsville, Maryland August 18-22, with an ECD Board meeting August 16-17. There will be less emphasis on business meetings and more on creative

learning experiences.

Three outstanding presenters will be featured at the 2004 convention:

Steve Hamerdinger, will make presentations on Friday evening and Saturday morning. As director of the Office of Deaf Services at the Alabama Department of Mental Health & Mental Retardation (DMHMR), Steve is the first Deaf person to hold an administrative-level position in Alabama state government. An exciting and dynamic presenter, he is much in demand all

over the nation. He is well-known for his imaginative and witty Power Point presentations

Steve's two presentations will be on the topics of cultural affirmation and empowerment issues in the Deaf community. As a bonus, Steve will provide our entertainment at the closing cookout on Saturday evening.

Cass Martensen will lead a forum titled "Hot Topics in the Episcopal Church." Cass, a late-deafened woman and a retired nurse, is senior warden of Trinity Church, Escondido, CA. A four-time deputy to General Convention she was chair of the Diocese of San Diego's deputation at the 2003 convention. Cass is also chair of her diocese's Task Force for Ministry with the Deaf and Hard of Hearing, and a Board member of the ECD.

We will be fortunate to have Cass' experience and insight on the "inside machinery" of the Episcopal Church. We're also very proud that she was chosen to be chair of her diocese's delegation! This is your opportunity to ask an expert "Whatever You Always Wanted to Know about the Episcopal Church but Were Afraid to Ask."

Chaplain for our convention will be the **Rev'd David Vryhof**, SSJE. Fluent in sign language, he is a brother of the Society of St. John the Evangelist, based in Cambridge, MA. Before coming to monastic life, he was a teacher of Deaf children. He has been a friend of the ECD for many years, and especially to St. Andrew's Mission of the Deaf in Brookline, MA.

David has responsibility for the training and spiritual formation of men who enter the SSJE community. A graduate of General Theological Seminary, he is a priest and an experienced teacher, retreat leader and spiritual director. In addition to leading several short spiritual workshops, he will be available for private conversations during the convention.

There is much more to tell. The hard-working committee from St. Barnabas' Mission of the Deaf, **Rudy Hines**, **James Lindsay** and **Thomas Hattaway**, are planning an optional Tour Day for Friday, August 20. You can either take the tour with a group, or visit Baltimore or Washington on your own.

More details are coming later. You will not want to miss this outstanding convention. Many people throughout the nation have already expressed interest in coming to this one.

So, get out your shiny new 2004 calendar, turn the pages and reserve August 16-22!

In 2003, we collected \$25,740 in pledge payments, which is 93% of what was pledged.

Thank you to the people who pledged in 2004. We lost one pledge unit (inactive member) and gained two pledge units. I also want to especially thank the four people who increased their pledge amount from 2003 to 2004.

If you want to pledge but haven't gotten around to it, please ask me for a pledge card.

From where did the money come?

In 2003, the total revenue of \$36,610 to fund the programs, missions and functions of St. Barnabas' came from:

70 % from pledges from current parishioners 30 % from other giving by parishioners, friends and visitors

This does not include the Diocesan support that includes our Vicar's compensation package as well as interpreter services. As Treasurer of St. Barnabas', I am very grateful to the Diocese for paying the Vicar's salary – I certainly don't take it for granted.

Where did the money go? In 2003, expenses totaled \$33,473

- 17% for Publicity and Hospitality (ECD Convention expenses, Verizon book ad, new flyers, refreshments, web page)
- 13% for Diocese (assessment) and National (UTO, Little Red Church, etc)

- 12% for scholarship for Gallaudet student (the student has received funding for 2004 tuition from other sources so this expense will not exist in 2004)
- 12% for Deaf Demographic Survey (funded from the Soper Fund)
- 12% for Admin and Finance such as the Messenger newsletter, annual audit, office equipment, pledge envelopes
- 10% for maintenance and operation (rent to St. John's, insurance)
- 5% for Gallaudet Campus ministry
- 5% for Christian Education program supplies
- 5% for Altar supplies, flowers, Sunday bulletin covers and inserts, vestments
- 5% for charity / outreach
- 2% for clergy utilities and expenses (pager, phone allowance)
- 2% for going away gift for former seminarian

Note: We had budgeted \$1,600 for a laptop for the Vicar in 2003 but did not buy it; we will buy it in 2004 instead.
