

A Word from the Rector

This past week I left St. John's by the side door leading to the Memorial Garden. I suddenly realized that the trees there were in bloom. I am not sure what kind of trees they are. At first, I thought they were dogwoods but as I drew nearer I decided they were not. For one thing, the flower did not look exactly like a dogwood. For a second thing, they gave off the most delightful fragrance. My memory is that

dogwoods do not have a fragrance, at least not a strong one.

I was fascinated with the blossoms. They were white with a kind of purple tint. Really quite unusual. My thoughts turned to Spring. The temperature and the wind suggested Winter, but the flowering trees spoke of Spring and Summer.

How often do we make decisions based on what the temperature seems to be according to how we feel? Perhaps we need to do a reality check from time to time. We need to take a look around us. What do we see?

Have you walked or driven around the city recently? Have you noticed how many people are standing out in the cold? Many are wearing everything that they own. They have no home, no place to go until the evening when the shelter will let them back in for supper and a night's sleep. How many of us have ever been homeless, cold, hungry. forced to sleep in a shelter or, even worse, sleep outside in the cold damp of Winter and early Spring? Our Lord had one set of clothes. Remember, at his crucifixion the soldiers gambled for his clothes and his seamless robe. Earlier in his ministry, when he was asked where he lived he answered. "foxes have holes and birds have nests, but the Son of Man has no place to lay his head".

As we move on in the Season of Lent, looking to Good Friday and Easter Sunday let us consider positive ways to keep a Holy Lent. What would it be like for you to buy a hot meal for someone who is hungry? What would it be like for you to offer a bed to a person who has no bed? What would it be like to visit a homeless shelter and tell them about the love of God in Christ Jesus? Our

Lord said, "In as much as you have done it unto the least of these my brethren, you have done unto me."

Consider ministering to others as a part of your Lenten discipline. Who knows? You just might discover a new way of life that will warm you in all Seasons.

About a dozen people attended the Lenten Study in the chapel before the February 29th service. We reviewed the lessons for 1 Lent. **Rudy Hines** read the first lesson, Dueteronomy 26: 1-4, 5-11.

Barbara+ handed out study questions. She said there is not one correct answer. Instead, the point of the study is to read and reflect on the scripture. Below are the questions so you can do this study at home.

What is happening in this story?

- Who are the characters in it?
- What can we know or imagine about them?
- What is happening in the group?
- How do the people in the story reflect the religious, political, social and even economic struggles of that time?

<u>How is this story like your own personal</u> story?

- How is it happening in our world, our nation, at work, school, church, neighborhood, in our homes?
- Do you find a similar story today on the front page of the newspaper or on TV?
- Who do we see today who are like those persons in the story?
- How do you see a similar story happening with you and other people who are important to you?
- Where do you see the same kind of struggles happening in you personally?

On March 7, the Lenten Study focused on Luke 13:22-35 and asked the questions:

- Who are the people in this story?
 What is happening here?
- What are the images in the story?
- What are the questions asked?
- Do we ask questions the same or similar to these from Jesus?
- What do we really want to know?

A Letter of Agreement has been signed between Episcopal Diocese of Washington and the Rev. Dr. Roger Pickering effective March 1, 2004.

The following is an excerpt:

Dr. Pickering agrees to serve the Episcopal Diocese of Washington as a consultant to St. Barnabas Church of the Deaf for the expansion of its mission and ministry among the deaf community.

Dr. Pickering will devote up to the equivalent of two days a month to this ministry. His duties include:

- 1. Serving as mentor and advisor to the Vicar of St. Barnabas Church;
- Covering services one Sunday per month to free the Vicar to serve satellite communities with a signed service;
- Lead workshops designed to facilitate the spiritual growth of members of the deaf community within the diocese; and
- 4. Such other duties as agreed upon with the Vicar for the enhancement and growth of diocesan ministry among the deaf.

New Banner Committee

Marlene Hines, Ginny Lindsay and Ed Knight have formed the Banner Committee. They are reading a book on how to design a banner. They would like to see submissions for a new

banner design, and it may become a contest. If you have banner design ideas, give them to the banner committee.

When the design is approved, then they will place an order for the new banner with a company (probably C.M. Almy.) If you would like to join the Banner Committee and help design the banner, see Marlene, Ginny or Ed.

<u>Virginia Theological Seminary</u>

Parish Meeting Report By Ed Knight

On March 21 we had our annual parish meeting. Barbara+ gave her report and I gave a Treasurer's Report. We discussed the following items:

- 2005 Budget accepted
- 2004 Charitable donations approved:

\$1000 to Deaf-Reach \$250 to Deaf-Blind Camp \$250 to Samaritan Ministry

- Easter Offering will go to the Holy Land Institute of the Deaf
- Berg Fund: Barbara+, myself, Jim and Rudy will get together with diocesan chancellor (lawyer) to look into using the interest (not principal)



from the Berg Fund for purposes compatible with its stipulations

- Parish Administrator: I am working with the diocese on details of the personnel process
- New signs: the consensus was to order 4 "add-on" signs, one for Bradley Lane, one for a new sign on Wisconsin Ave, one for Ascension in Gaithersburg, and one for St. George's in Glenn Dale. There was a vote on whether to include the service times on the signs and it was approved.
- New banner: old designs for the banner were revisited and new designs discussed, but no decision

made. Barbara+ suggested a banner design contest and the consensus was that this is a good idea.

- ECD Delegate and Alternate: Tom Hattaway was elected ECD Delegate and Ginny Lindsay was elected the Alternate
- Communion bread vs wafers was discussed and there were no strong feelings on the matter. The consensus was to either continue with the loaf-style bread or only have wafers occasionally.


