Barbara mentioned there is also a need for new Altar Guild members. **Marlene Hines** reminded us that the Altar Guild member must show up at least 30 minutes prior to the service to set up. Ed Knight suggested that if someone doesn't want to come early, perhaps they could team up with another person so that one person takes the "early shift" before the service and the other person takes the "late shift" after the service.

It is to be noted that you do not have to be a member of the Altar Guild to help clean up on Sunday after the service. We are grateful to those who help frequently even though they are not on the Altar Guild.

Barbara also announced that for now the Signed Eucharist at St. George's Glenn Dale will continue to be celebrated on the last Sunday of each month at 1:30 PM.

Report on Region 3 Assembly **By Ed Knight**

On Saturday, October 23, I attended the Episcopal Diocese of Washington Region 3 Assembly at St. Dunstan's in Bethesda. **Libby McKnight** and **Karen Newquist** were present to interpret but unfortunately no deaf people attended.

About 50 people attended the Holy Eucharist, followed by a Welcome by **Bishop John Bryson Chane** and a presentation on "Congregational Development: Reaching the Unchurched and the Dechurched" by **the Rev. George G. Hunter III,** a professor at Asbury Theological Seminary in Kentucky and author of a number of books including [The Celtic Way of Evangelism: How Christianity Can Reach the West...Again.](#)

For the most part I am paraphrasing, not using exact quotes.

Small churches that grow adopt people into the life of a clan. *Invite people to share in doing something useful for other people.*

There is a lot of truth in the old saying "Christian faith is more caught than taught". Much of evangelism is based upon listening. Pray with people and pray for people.

I have a few notes from the Q&A time with **Bishop Chane.** I am paraphrasing, not being exact. The diocesan staff spends much time helping congregations that are in conflict or crisis. The problem is often made worse by outdated bylaws. The diocese needs congregations to have uniform bylaws. Every congregation needs to re-evaluate their bylaws. It would be helpful to have "boilerplate" bylaws for congregations to use in getting their bylaws into compliance. Although diocesan staff can help, congregations in the diocese also need to reach out to each other and help each other.

The Sign-a-thon had a slightly smaller crowd than usual yet still raised over \$2,500 and was therefore a financial success. St. Barnabas' members **Ed Knight, Mae Lynn Mullen and Shelley Simms** attended.

Advocates for Communication Technology for Deaf-Blind People is a volunteer, non-profit organization established and incorporated in 1987 for the purpose of enhancing communication for Deaf-Blind People

On Saturday October 30, Metro Washington Association of the Deaf-Blind held a 20th-Anniversary Luncheon at Capital City Brewing Company in NE D.C. near Union Station, and St. Barnabas' members **Iris Gomes, Jim and Ginny Lindsay, Ed Knight, Michael Martin, Mae Lynn Mullen and Shelley Simms** attended to celebrate. 82 people attended including 24 deaf-blind people. Thanks to **Ginny, Iris** and all the volunteer Support Service Providers for helping with the tactile interpreting and in general being useful to deaf-blind people.

The **Rev. Peggy Johnson** of Christ UMC of the Deaf brought a busload of people from Baltimore and led the opening prayer. Former President **Blaise Delahoussaye** gave a speech about MWADB history and mentioned the role that former St. Barnabas' vicar **the Rev. Jay Croft and Dr. Frances Croft** played in founding MWADB. He talked about how important MWADB has been in helping the local deaf-blind population fight loneliness, learn that they are not alone in their frustrations and share ideas for coping.

In addition to the current president and Blaise, former MWADB presidents **Ann Black, Steven Frank, Jamie McNamara Pope, Lisa Pugh** and the first MWADB president **Jack Wright** stood together for a photo opportunity.

American Association of the Deaf-Blind Vice President and MWADB parliamentarian **Arthur Roehrig** gave a speech about his role in the history of MWADB and how the deaf-blind community has changed in the past 20 years, particularly due to changes in technology and attitudes.

Art said that 20 years ago deaf-blind people relied on the Postal Service to communicate or were just starting to use the TeleBraille which had then recently

entirely through email and the MWADB board voted using an Email Voting Protocol.

Now AADB has three full-time staffers working on legislation and lobbying. Although the Federal government keeps count of deaf-blind youths there is no Federal census of deaf-blind adults. The Federal government helps support the Helen Keller National Center in New York which trains deaf-blind adults in independent living skills and vocational rehabilitation, but there is no national clearinghouse of resources for deaf-blind adults. AADB has started collecting that information and is establishing a national SSP network.
