Many of you may know a retired deafblind man named **Jack Wright** (the first MWADB president) who visited us in October. According to **the Rev. Peggy Johnson** of Christ Church UMC in Baltimore, Jack has moved to Baltimore where he is closer to one of his daughters and also the Workforce Technology Center where he has enrolled in some activities. You may be aware that a number of years ago Jack won a lawsuit against an apartment complex in Wheaton that denied him housing on account of his deafblindness. That apartment management company was required by the court to give Jack a rent-free apartment for life. It turns out that that same apartment company owns an apartment building in Baltimore, and thankfully Jack was able to move to that building and continue to live rent-free.

During the December 5 Morning Advent Study, **Tracy Dieter** led an Advent Wreath workshop. **Christina Duley** made a wreath with assistance from **Marlene Hines**. **Kary Dyer** and **Ed Knight** also made wreaths (although we won't show a picture of Ed's wreath, hah.) **Tom Hattaway** and **Kary Dyer** were kind enough to make a wreath for the rector, which she much enjoyed during the rest of the season.

Barbara shared some history about Christmas celebrations. Back in the 17th century the Puritans in England outlawed the celebration of Christmas, and then the Puritans in Massachusetts passed the same laws and actually put people in jail for celebrating Christmas. The Puritans, who were very serious and sober, disapproved of parties and celebrations. On December 5 **Johnny Najar** came with his brother **Robert Najar** who is visiting from New England. Johnny is living in an assisted living facility in Frederick, but we are happy to say his health is improving and so he and his brother are looking for another living arrangement for him which is closer to the D.C. area deaf community including St. Barnabas'.

During Fellowship Time, **Kary Dyer** and **Tom Hattaway** provided refreshments including a cake to celebrate December birthdays, especially the birthday of **Jesus**. Thanks Kary and Tom!

On Sunday December 12, Barbara gave a sermon on our need to witness to others what God has done in our lives. When someone is sick or experiencing adversity, we say we are sorry or extend our sympathy, but how often do we tell them how God has helped us get through bad times? In the Gospel of Matthew, John the Baptist who is in prison sends his messengers to visit Jesus and ask him if he is the one who is to come (the Messiah). It is a very straightforward question but Jesus does not give a straightforward answer. Instead, Jesus tells them to tell John what they have witnessed the blind receiving sight, the lame walking, the deaf hearing, the dead rising to new life, and the poor receiving good news. Barbara explained that it is not our duty to preach to others, rather it is to witness the good things we have seen God do.

During the announcement time **Barbara** said that she had laser treatment for her eye and although her vision is not quite back to normal it has improved some.

Report on December 12 Open Forum with the Presiding Bishop By Ed Knight

On December 12 at 7 PM there was an open forum, "The Anglican Communion: Crucible of Difference," in Perry Auditorium of the National Cathedral. About eighty or ninety people attended. These are my notes of comments by **Presiding Bishop Frank Griswold.** These are not necessarily exact quotes.

Anglicanism is relational and incarnational. We are at a moment of history in which we are being invited to live communion on a deeper level. This means entering the reality of the other and seeing in each other the face of the risen Christ. The Windsor Report contains a number of invitations to this deeper level of communion.

The words "conversation" and "conversion" have the same Latin root. The only things that get reported are the conflicts but behind the scenes there are conversations happening that are building up the body instead of tearing it down.

Someone recently said to Griswold not to worry, the non-European Anglicans "will catch up with us". Griswold says that that remark shows some of the condescension and arrogance that the non-European churches have experienced. A deeper level of communion with non-European Anglicans means more than sending money. We have to enter into their reality.

In some non-European Anglican churches there has been much more of an emphasis on scripture compared to the sacraments in part due to a historic shortage of priests. (However, scripture is itself sacramental; we meet Jesus in the pages of the Bible.)

Evangelism needs to be done in different ways in different parts of the Communion. For instance, England now has an extremely secular culture and what might work best in that context is not necessarily appropriate in our context.

In the Acts of the Apostles, the Holy Spirit leaps beyond the bounds of who is "in" and who is "out" to include the Gentiles. This is very surprising to the Jewish Christian community because the Gentiles don't observe the Jewish Law. The community had to step back and turn to scripture and do theological reflection. So in the Bible sometimes things happen first and then people have to reflect later.

In the Bible sickness is often seen either as punishment from God or as being caused by evil spirits. For instance, some of the illness depicted in the New Testament that is attributed to demon possession we now recognize as epilepsy. The authors of the Bible were part of a community that did not have access to the medical knowledge we have now. It seems we respect the expansion of truth in some areas but not in others. We are never in full possession of the truth. Truth is discovered in communion.

Griswold is against a structural change to the Anglican Communion because that would merely be a technical fix and would not necessarily help accomplish the deeper level of communion that is needed.

Gallaudet Student Activities On December 18 the Rev. Barbara Allen, Davak Dashuwar, Steven Frank, Ed Knight and Michael Martin went to the National Museum of the American Indian. They watched a movie "Who We Are" (captioned through a small pager-like device) and viewed the three permanent exhibitions: Our Universes, Our Peoples, and Our Lives. Barbara sign-interpreted for the curator for the "Our Lives" exhibition, who said she was half Navaio and half Southern Ute. She said that historically the colonists from Europe considered the Native Americans as "heathen" and "inferior", and later as objects of scientific study. The Museum is an opportunity for Native Americans to tell their own stories instead of being labeled. She spoke about the Pocahontas story. Native Americans don't have their own written languages but they can record history through pictographs. Pictographs have been found as well as stories passed down through generations that indicate that Pocahontas was captured by British colonists and kept as a hostage in the prison on the British ship for use in a prisoner exchange and for ransom of corn, which the colonists desperately needed.

Dayak Dashuwar is a Junior studying Criminology and Information Systems Management. He is from Nigeria and says there are currently 15 students from Nigeria attending Gallaudet.

Steven Frank is the Recreation and Social Chair for the Metropolitan Washington Association of the Deaf-Blind. The information desk gave him a Braille guidebook and another large print publication which he will share with MWADB members to help prepare them for the March 5 MWADB Tour of the museum.


