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The Rev. Dr. Roger pickering Sermon Notes

On June 5, **Father Roger** gave a sermon on the gospel reading of Hosea 5:15-6:6 in which the prophet Hosea gives us a definition of the nature of God. The Hebrew word is Chesed, which can be interpreted as mercy or steadfast love. In the story Hosea's wife is unfaithful to him but he forgives her. God treats Isreal (and us) the way Hosea treats his straying wife — with forgiveness and steadfast love.

We also know about God's loving nature through the example of Jesus Christ.

Jesus shared tablefellowship with sinners such as tax-collectors, in a society where it was a sin to eat with sinners. Jesus reveals the extent of God's love. Jesus came into the world to save sinners. The church is called a hospital for sinners. God is faithful without limit. God cares about our misbehavior and it hurts him deeply but God never withholds love. As the Gospel reading says, God desires steadfast love and not sacrifice, the knowledge of God rather than burnt offerings.

MEETING WITH CANON TO THE ORDINARY

REGARDLESS OF THE NAME "MISSION" OR "CHURCH" ST. BARNABAS' IS A *PERMANANENT* CONGREGATION OF THE DIOCESE. On June 26, the Mission Committee met with Canon to the Ordinary Paul Cooney. Mother Barbara, Tom Hattaway, Marlene and Rudy Hines, Ed Knight, Wendy Kohashi-Ikezawa, Jim Lindsay, Mary Malzkuhn, Mae Lynn Mullen, and Shelley Simms attended. A Canon to the Ordinary serves as a sort of lawyer for the diocese. Paul explained that in the Episcopal Church there are three kinds of congregations: Mission, Parish, and Cathedral. A mission is a church of the diocese, or a church of the bishop. A parish is a self-supporting separate corporation. A

cathedral is the one parish in any diocese where the Bishop is seated. Each type of congregation has its own type of clergy: a Mission has a Vicar, a Parish has a Rector, and a Cathedral has a Dean. The governing body of a Mission is a Mission Committee while for a parish it is a vestry and a Cathedral has a chapter.

Every member of the Episcopal Church is equal; the different titles have to do with custom, not status.

The Bishop wants to make it clear that regardless of the name "mission" or "church" that St. Barnabas' is a *permananent* congregation of the diocese. Rudy Hines pointed out that unlike other missions, we serve the whole diocese. (Our members come from several Maryland counties and several quadrants of D.C.)

The role of bishop is a role of oversight. Paul said that Bishop Chane sees oversight as support: the Bishop is there to support the work of the Vicar and the Mission Committee.

Thank you to Paul Cooney for coming to worship with us and to clarify for us some Episcopal terminology.

THE PASTOR'S CORNER:

On August 3, 2005 the ECD Board received an e-mail from the Rev. Jay Croft, ECD President, stating that due to numerous personal responsibilities he felt that he could not continue in his office and was resigning from the Board immediately. He said that he would not attend Convention and was passing on the presidency, pro tempore, to me, the First Vice-President. We were all shocked, but I think I was most taken aback!

However, I knew that somewhere in this difficult situation there was something to be learned. I soon received e-mails from the Board members reminding me that we were a team and would work together as we always have. They reminded me that I "was not alone". What a comforting feeling, "not alone". We all arrived on August 8 and began our preparation for Convention which would begin on August 10. Â Two days of hard work brought us great benefit and we were ready for Convention to begin.

The St. Thomas Church of the Deaf Committee did a fantastic job in planning and hosting us. The theme of this 69th ECD Convention was **Recharge and En***ergize*. We met at the Pallotine Spiritual Center in Florissant, MO, just outside of St. Louis. A beautiful, quiet Catholic center where five sisters of the Pallotine Order live there and manage the facility. They were wonderfully warm, welcoming and cooperative in every way!

The Convention was especially inspiring this year. We saw many new faces, persons who had never before attended an ECD Convention. We elected one of those new persons, the Rev. Carla McCook from Salem, VA, to the ECD Board as Second Vice President. The Rev. Deacon William Mosier from St. Hilda's in Portland, OR was elected President. I was reelected to a second term as First Vice-President. David Early from St. Thomas was re-elected as Treasurer. Dave is going on his tenth year. The Rev. Marianne Stevens, Vicar of All Souls', Philadelphia, was re-elected as Secretary. Our own Dr. Mary Malzkuhn was elected as Member at Large and Cass Martensen from San Diego, CA was re-elected as Member at Large. Mary was also our delegate to Convention and Ginny Lindsay was the alternate.

We welcomed **the Upchurchs** from Norman, OK. Stan is an ordained deacon and serves his church in Norman. He has been losing his hearing for the past seven years or so. He learned of the ECD and felt he wanted to become a part of us along with his wife. Stan teaches history and is an historian. He has done a great deal of work with the National Church Archives and has promised to work with the Board in an advisory capacity on how to preserve the historical records of the ECD.

The Rev. Roy Brown,

Vicar of St. Andrews Church of the Deaf in Boston was our Chaplain as well as our techie for all the electronic devices we use to make Convention as accessible as possible. He spoke on What is the Church? using hand drawings which he had done himself. The main idea was to determine the difference between Church and church Do you know the difference?

All in all we had a great Convention! Almost forty people attended with over fifty coming to share in the banquet on Saturday night. Great food, great accommodations, great fellowship, inspiring workshops and Chaplain time, peaceful surroundings and great cooperation and teamwork!

On the Sunday before I left our gospel was on Peter walking on the water to Jesus. You may remember that I used that to illustrate what I felt I had been suddenly called to do. I was inspired when a number of you began to use that expression when you talked of having a difficult task to do. We are often called to "walk on water", at least it feels like that. Let Jesus buoy you up in those times and you can "walk on water".

JULY 4TH WEEKEND SERVICE

On July 3, **Mother Barbara** gave a sermon about war and peace. She had received an email from a friend in Kentucky asking for our prayers, including a prayer that the war in Iraq end soon if it is God's will. Mother Barbara's reaction was that it is never God's will that war begin in the first place. Wars happen because people will them to happen. Wars begin because people want something — power, land, forcing someone else to do things my way, or even the belief that short-term war will win long-term peace.

There is also a war inside of us, as Saint Paul describes in Romans. Mother Barbara recalled a story she had heard from an American Indian myth that we each have two wolves inside of us — one that is peaceful and one that is violent. The two wolves are fighting within us. The one that wins is the one that we choose to feed. Mother Barbara has heard people refer to some personal hardship such as caring for an aging relative as "my cross to bear". She believes that fighting this internal war is our true cross to bear.

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
