BOOK REVIEW — A GENEROUS OTHODOXY BY BRIAN MCLAREN Reviewed by Ed Knight

I just finished an interesting book by Brian McLaren entitled "a Generous Orthodoxy". McLaren is a pastor of a church in Maryland who grew up in a very conservative Christian tradition and since then has acquired a great deal of experience worshiping and working with Christians from a wide variety of traditions. He values tradition and orthodoxy but not as ways to define "in-groups" and "out-groups". The subtitle of his book suggests that he identifies with more than twenty different flavors of Christianity, including both liberal and conservative. It made me wonder if he could possibly be serious about belonging to so many traditions some of which seem mutually exclusive. Although the book is often humorous in tone, he actually is serious about the subtitle, devoting one chapter to each of these Christian denominations or traditions. McLaren's faith journey took him through many denominations but he never completely rejected his earlier churches and instead integrated them into his faith. Although he describes himself as an amateur without theological credentials, his writing shows an encyclopedic knowledge of many Christian traditions.

McLaren gives an overview of different understandings of salvation. "For conservative Protestants and Roman Catholics ... Jesus saves individuals through the cross and resurrection; for Eastern Orthodox followers, Jesus saves the world through the incarnation; for liberal Protestants and Anabaptists, Jesus saves through his teaching and example." McLaren then asks a question that seems obvious but I hadn't heard before -- why not celebrate all of these ways of affirming Jesus as Savior?

McLaren does believe in personal salvation, but has decided over the years that following Jesus should not be about personal salvation alone, which can be self-interested. Instead for Mclaren, following Jesus is more about sharing and making evident God's love for the world — a world that is in serious need of healing. McLaren is not so much interested in the theological arguments about who goes to heaven (exclusivism Vs. inclusivism Vs. universalism) because God will make those decisions without our help. Where God needs our help is in saving the world from the real danger of mankind destroying it, and in sharing the gospel in ways that encourage others to join us. McLaren believes in looking at people from other religions not as enemies but as "beloved neighbors". McLaren hopes to express his love for Jesus in a persuasive way that leads individuals from any religion into becoming followers of Jesus without necessarily giving up their tradition.

McLaren says "although I believe Jesus is my personal savior, I am not a Christian for that reason. I am a Christian because I believe that Jesus is the savior of the whole world."

McLaren describes "emergent" Christianity, which if I understand correctly is not so much a theology as a philosophy that respects the theological roots of Christianity and yet sees Christian orthodoxy as a process that is still unfolding. McLaren compares "emergent" Christianity with a cross-section of a tree: "each ring represents not a replacement of the previous rings, not a rejection of them, but an embracing of them, a comprising of them and inclusion of them into something bigger."


