On September 24, the Mission Committee had its first meeting since the beginning of summer. Secretary **Wendy Ikezawa** submitted very detailed minutes from the April 30th meeting. Treasurer **Jim Lindsay** provided a thorough report on finances including a report on the Kramer investment fund. We discussed whether or not to visit Grace Church in Silver Spring to evaluate it as a more spacious worship space opportunity because there is not much room to grow in the Chapel at St. John's. The consensus was that although there is more space and more parking there, the current Chapel is more conducive to worship than meeting in a parish hall type of setting. We voted to proceed with getting Comcast cable for the office, which will pave the way for getting a Video Phone. We discussed the Coffee Hour arrangements. We also had a meeting on October 22. The Pastor's Corner:

I have been thinking a lot recently about how different things seem to happen in parallel. The present protest and dissension at our own Gallaudet University prompted me to look more deeply into this idea. It is very important to look at the underlying causes for disagreement. I think of an advertisement I see in this area for a consulting firm. It says that they are committed to "finding and curing" the causes of homelessness. Now, I can understand looking for the cure but I think that the causes are right here "under our noses" as the saying goes. Inequality of power, the wide gap between the "haves" and the "have nots".

The causes for dissension are always related to inequality of power. Someone in the Deaf Community recently contacted me asking what they could do to help at Gallaudet. I had to explain that the Office of Campus Ministries holds a position of neutrality and supports the entire university community. OCM was present and offering space and counseling to those who chose to accept it. The point is that this person was feeling frustrated, worried and frightened about what is happening at Gallaudet. This person wanted to "do something". They wanted to plan a prayer service at their church. That would be fine but transportation to the church for Gallaudet students would have been difficult. I suggested that they plan a prayer service for the members of their church to pray for the situation at Gallaudet. That offered this person a way of gaining control over a situation which is out of their control.

That is what happens to all of us when we find ourselves in a situation over which we have no control. We grasp at straws trying to gain control, we become even more angry and frustrated which sets us up to make unwise decisions and poor choices. Our need to control has been the ultimate cause of disagreements, wars, oppression, even actual murders. Some murders are death by physical harm and others are destruction of reputation and self image.

What is the answer? I think that we need to recognize that none of us really have control over anything. It is God who has control. Each of us perceives God in our own way. You may perceive God as female or male or simply spirit. The point is that if we are willing to "let go" and let God handle a situation God will offer a solution.

That solution may come in many forms; an actual voice in our minds, through a friend, through reading scripture, reading books from fellow travelers on this earth who have been in the same spiritual place we are, poems, quiet solitude. So many ways that God can speak. God understands all communication, speech, sign language, writing, thoughts.

I hope that you will consider your own need for being in control. If you realize that that need is causing problems then take that to God and wait for God to give you a solution. I wish you peace of heart, mind, body and soul,
